If you do not pass the screening, your physician will be informed so that he or she can evaluate you and determine the best next steps for your care. If you have been exposed to COVID-19 or are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, please reach out to your care team **prior** to your arrival.

VISITOR POLICY 🧭



We currently have a **no visitor policy in place, with** limited exceptions. We know that families and caregivers are essential members of your care team and we encourage you to have them join your appointment virtually. If bringing a caregiver is critical due to physical or cognitive needs, an exception can be made to allow one adult visitor.

If you have a scheduled appointment and you prefer a telephone or video call, please call or send a MyChart message to your provider. Not all visits can or should be handled through Telehealth. Your care team will determine whether an appointment should proceed in-person or move to Telehealth.

If you are interested and eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine or booster, please let your care team know so that they can arrange for this at an upcoming appointment. If you have any concerns about receiving the vaccine, please reach out to your physician for guidance.




RADIATION ONCOLOGY EARNED 2ND ASTRO APEX® ACCREDITATION

For women who require the services of a breast surgeon, the Ridley-Tree team of Rosa Choi, MD, FACS and Katrina B. Mitchell, MD, IBCLC, PMH-C, FACS offer patients a combined 30+ years of experience solely focused on breast concerns. Whether surgery is required for breast cancer or another condition, Drs. Choi and Mitchell utilize the latest surgical advancements in their practice, including oncoplastic techniques for breast conservation.

Along with training from top academic medical centers, our breast surgeons are **certified by the top professional societies** in their field, and utilize the latest clinical research when recommending care for women.

Fellowship-trained in breast surgical oncology, Dr. Mitchell is also a certified lactation consultant, and has developed a course on breastfeeding medicine for breast surgeons. Breast surgical treatment, together with medical and/or radiation oncology, are the mainstays of breast cancer care. Our breast surgeons work with patients to determine which type of surgery is most appropriate, and if it should occur before or after chemotherapy. Drs. Choi and Mitchell also collaborate with local plastic surgeons when women choose mastectomy with reconstruction. 🥏

Radiology plays a critical role in detecting, treating and monitoring breast cancer. Our **Breast Imaging Program** is an integral part of Ridley-Tree's comprehensive, team-based approach to caring for women and men with breast cancer and benign breast disease. Our breast radiologists and technologists have extensive training with the latest image technology and image-guided procedures. Their expertise alongside this world-class technology helped Sansum Clinic earn the **American College of Radiology Breast Imaging Center of Excellence** designation, signifying the highest level of imaging quality, safety and care. This accreditation recognizes services ranging from mammograms to breast MRIs and ultrasounds, to image-guided procedures such as biopsies and localizations.

Winifred Leung, MD is Sansum Clinic's fellowship-trained breast radiologist. Dr. Leung specializes in all aspects of breast imaging including MRI and image-guided biopsy. She is the current chair of the Santa Barbara Breast Care Alliance, an NAPBC-accredited *"breast center without walls"* of which Sansum Clinic and Ridley-Tree are founding participants.

Investment in the highestquality breast imaging alongside a highly-trained team has a direct impact on cancer detection and health. When breast cancer is caught before it spreads, the five-year breast cancer survival rate is 99 percent or greater.

RAISING AWARENESS

A t Ridley-Tree Cancer Center, we recognize and celebrate the diversity of our Santa Barbara County community. February is both Black History Month and National Cancer Prevention Month, an important time to highlight the higher incidence of cancer among black Americans and remind our community members of essential steps to take towards cancer prevention.

According to the CDC, black men are diagnosed with and die from cancer at higher rates than men of other races and ethnicities in the United States. Black women who develop breast cancer are 40% more likely to die from the disease as compared to white women. Cancer is the second leading cause of death among black people in our country. Researchers and communities are actively working to identify and address the issues that lead to this disparity, including social and economic inequalities.

Given this disproportionately higher cancer burden on the black community, the following cancer prevention strategies are especially important to reducing your risk of cancer:

SCREENINGS:

- Learn about the screening exams that detect the five most common types of cancer, and speak to your primary care physician to receive a specific recommendation for when you and your loved ones should receive your screenings:
 - Mammograms for breast cancer.
 - Pap smears for cervical cancer.

Cancer is the second leading cause of death among black people in our country.

- Prostate-specific antigen (PSA) testing for prostate cancer.
- Colonoscopies for colon cancer.
- CT scanning for lung cancer.

FAMILY HISTORY:

 Discuss cancer with your family members to determine if there is any family medical history that could increase your cancer risk.

DIET:

• Eat a healthy diet with fruits, vegetables, whole grains and low-fat milk products. Choose foods that are low in saturated fats, cholesterol, salt and added sugars.

EXCERCISE:

 Exercise regularly by participating in 30 minutes of daily physical activity.

LIFESTYLE:

 Avoid tobacco products and alcoholic beverages. If you choose to drink, do so in moderation, no more than one drink a day for women and two for men.

Our team is dedicated to providing superior cancer care to anyone that walks through our doors. If you would like to learn more about our Community Health program that provides cancer prevention services for our community, please call **(805) 879-5678**.

In January 2021, the U.S. Senate passed the Henrietta Lacks Enhancing Cancer Research Act. The legislation seeks to reduce barriers and improve access to clinical trials for communities that are traditionally underrepresented in trials.

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BATTLING FIRES & CANCER

The physical demands firefighters face on the job are extreme, impacting their safety and their health. Exposure to pathogens and toxic elements within an already stressful work setting leaves firefighters at heightened risk for cancer and cardiovascular problems. A National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) study completed in 2020 looked at 30,000 career firefighters over a 50-year period and discovered a 9% increase in all cancer diagnoses and a 14% increase in all cancer-related deaths. The rising cases of cancer in younger firefighters could be linked to environmental exposures, or to more frequent cancer screenings.

Lompoc Fire Captain **Christopher Martinez** is a passionate advocate for annual firefighter physicals, since the 2019 exam required by his own department wound up flagging stage II colon cancer. The 44 year-old

husband and father was the picture of health, a nonsmoker and healthy eater with a rigorous daily exercise regimen and no family history of cancer. When results from his department exam showed he was anemic, Christopher visited his primary care physician David Phreaner, MD. The bloodwork abnormality was puzzling to them both since the same tests appeared completely normal eight months earlier. The only symptom Christopher had at that time was minor fatigue, which as a hardworking firefighter, seemed like just a regular part of the job. Not long after their appointment when Christopher noticed a bloody stool, Dr. Phreaner referred him to gastroenterologist Vincent DeRosa, MD who performed a combined endoscopy and colonoscopy. Those tests and a subsequent biopsy confirmed Christopher's colon cancer diagnosis.

Surgical oncologist **W. Charles Conway, MD, FACS** removed Christopher's tumor and said he was lucky to have found the fast-growing malignancy before any

more symptoms had begun to appear. Dr. Conway's warm, caring manner and attention to detail comforted Christopher, his wife, Xochitl and sister, Laura, both nurses at Cottage Hospital. "He listened to all of us. It was a big weight off my shoulders," says Christopher. Post-surgery, Dr. Conway referred the family to Ridley-Tree Cancer Center, where they selected oncologist and hematologist Mukul Gupta, MD to guide them through treatment. They all appreciated Dr. Gupta's immense time investment to help them understand the medical research and information surrounding the diagnosis. "I felt like he gave me the opportunity to feel empowered in the decision-making process," shares Christopher. When chemotherapy began, Christopher and Dr. Gupta coordinated to try and find the best ways for his strenuous, pre-dawn workouts to

> continue. Christopher pushed through his daily run and hundreds of push-ups despite fatigue and nausea. *"I was determined to be stronger from this,"* he recalls. A big motivator was his

daughter, Luisa, eight years-old at the time. Having lost his mother as a third grader, Christopher longed to protect his child from any fear or worry caused by his illness. Oncology social worker April Calderon, MSW met with Luisa to help her manage the stress of having a parent with cancer. "Sometimes, kids take a lot of that brunt. Ridley-Tree supported that aspect, so I could focus on recovery," explains Christopher. His patient navigator Sam Howland, MS commanded care logistics, so he could reap all the benefits of a multi-disciplinary center where specialist teams rally around patients to provide support. Oncology nutrition dietitian Sarah Washburn, MS, RDN, CSO, personalized a diet for Christopher that would provide adequate nutrition, while limiting any side effects from the chemotherapy. Special attention from Nurse Practitioner Erica Koeppen, DNP and Medical Assistants Elizabeth Cuevas and Kathy Judy was the icing on the cake, and made Christopher feel right at home during his visits.

The transition into remission felt a little rocky for Christopher, who was boosted mentally knowing he was cancer-free, but frustrated that his stamina and mental sharpness was taking time to return. *"When you hear about people with cancer who are in remission, you think they are fine, they beat it, they don't need support,"* he admits. *"I struggled, but I learned this is typical."* Dr. Gupta encouraged Christopher to be patient since his body might need many months to be fully-restored. Meantime, he channeled his energies into advocacy for annual firefighter physicals for all area fire departments. Christopher built a cancer awareness curriculum for firefighters, used by California's Office of the State Fire Marshal, where he is one of only a handful of certified behavioral health and cancer awareness instructors. He regularly presents lectures for Allan Hancock College's Fire Academy, and he gave a 2021 community presentation at an event co-hosted by Ridley-Tree and Cottage Health where he inspired the audience of Spanish speakers to stay current with their

annual medical exams and cancer screening tests. With cancer, heart disease, lung disease and infectious disease among the leading causes of death for firefighters, there is no time to waste, according to Christopher. "The fight doesn't just end, it continues. I want to address this so we can support each other."

Thanks to the generosity of donors in the area, we have the ability to provide the level of top-notch care that would be delivered at major academic medical centers.

STAGES OF COLORECTAL CANCER


STAGE I: Tumor has grown into the inner wall of the colon or rectum but not grown through the wall.

STAGE II: Tumor extends more deeply into or through the wall of the colon or rectum. Cancer cells may have spread into nearby tissue but not the lymph nodes.

STAGE III: Cancer has spread to nearby lymph nodes but not other parts of the body.

STAGE IV: Cancer has spread to other parts of the body, such as liver or lungs.

Sansum Clinic recommends that **asymptomatic** people start regular colorectal cancer screening at age **45 years**.

If you have any of the **following symptoms**, call your doctor to schedule a colonoscopy immediately:

- Rectal bleeding
- Change in frequency and consistency of bowels
- Abdominal pain
- Anemia

COLONOSCOPY

Reminder Schedule Your Scionoscopy Todayi A **colonoscopy** is the preferred screening test and should be **repeated every 10 years** so that any **polyps** can be removed before they turn into cancer. If any polyps are found, the colonoscopy may be repeated sooner.

Approximately **5% to 10%** of colon cancers are **hereditary**. If you or someone in your family has been diagnosed with colon cancer you may benefit from meeting with our genetic counselors. They can provide a personalized risk assessment to help you and your physician better understand your genetic risk for colon cancer. Thank you to all who have supported this effort, allowing us to continue to deliver on our commitment to patients in Santa Barbara County.





ONCOLOGY SOCIAL WORK

Because a cancer diagnosis often brings many psychological, social and economic challenges for patients and their families, caseworkers in Ridley-Tree's **Oncology Social Work Department** are at the ready to provide critical assistance so patients' basic daily needs are met, and so any barriers to treatment can be removed.

Caseworkers help patients to obtain medical services, transportation, food and housing. They advocate for patients, so they can better coordinate with state and community agencies. *"This greatly eases the burden,"* explains **Sherry Massey**, a 25-year veteran of the Oncology Social Work Department. *"I often receive requests from patients who tried to resolve issues with Medi-Cal, Social Security or California's Disability Insurance Department* placards, writing time-off letters to employers, and many other tasks that help to lighten the load. *"I have the opportunity to provide great resources,"* says Ana. *"This team works so hard for the wellbeing of the patient."*

Laura Gonzalez has been a Ridley-Tree caseworker for the last 7 years. She enjoys speaking with her patients by phone, meeting to discuss their medical bills or calling healthcare insurance providers to coordinate coverage. ADVANCEMENTS IN TECHNOLOGY

IMPROVING PROSTATE CANCER DIAGNOSTICS WITH PYLARIFY®

Ridley-Tree's Nuclear Medicine Department is now using a radioactive agent called PYLARIFY® (F18-PSMA) to provide more accurate and earlier detection of prostate cancer than our previous imaging methods. This diagnostic tracer, approved by the FDA in May 2021, helps physicians in two scenarios: 1) when a patient is newly diagnosed and the physicians want maximum information about the prostate cancer's location before treatment, and 2) when a patient who was previously treated for prostate cancer has a blood test that suggests cancer has returned.


"Conventional imaging is limited in terms of its ability to find prostate cancer in the initial staging, and when determining if the disease has recurred or spread," explains **William Pace, MD**, Nuclear Medicine Physician. "PYLARIFY® provides us with exceptional clarity and precision that can find and track the spread of prostate cancer much earlier, undetectable by prior imaging methods.

In addition to the advances in diagnostic imaging, Ridley-Tree Cancer Center **recently opened a clinical trial utilizing lutetium therapy** in the treatment of patients with newlydiagnosed metastatic prostate cancer. This process involves injecting a radioactive molecule (lutetium) into the vein, allowing a high dose of radiation to be delivered straight to cancer cells in any location within the body. This therapy, available in Germany for many years, improved outcomes in patients who received but progressed on chemotherapy. *"The medical oncologists and the nuclear medicine physicians at Ridley-Tree hope to bring this treatment to patients earlier in their course of therapy, even before receiving chemotherapy,"* remarks **Gregg Newman, MD**, Medical Oncologist.

F18-PSMA / PET-CT imaging has greatly advanced how urologists and oncologists can view prostate cancer metastases and how they stage the disease. In patients with an elevated prostate specific antigen (PSA), Pylarify® was able to detect the location of the recurrent disease in nearly 2 out of 3 patients, when the disease was



NUTRITION FOR CANCER PATIENTS

Tips from Oncology Dietitian Nutritionist Rebecca Colvin, MPH, RDN, CSO

STAYING HYDRATED

COUNT ALL FLUIDS, NOT JUST WATER!

E very day, we lose fluid through normal bodily functions, making replenishing fluids very important for optimal health. For cancer patients, staying hydrated is essential because cancer treatment can be taxing on your body and increases your risk of dehydration.

WHY IS STAYING HYDRATED IMPORTANT?

- Fluids transport nutrients and oxygen, protect our internal organs, lubricate our joints and digestive tract, help sustain energy and regulate heart rate and blood pressure.
- Fluids help your body get rid of toxins and the byproducts of chemotherapy.
- Good hydration can reduce treatment side effects, such as dehydration, diarrhea, vomiting, dry mouth, constipation, fatigue and nausea.

HOW MUCH FLUID DO YOU REALLY NEED?

Each person has unique hydration needs. For healthy adults, divide your weight by two to determine how many ounces of fluid to aim for in a day. For example, if you weigh 150 pounds, your daily fluid intake should be at least 75 ounces. If you are in cancer treatment, it is important to consult your medical care team, including your oncology nutritionist, to help determine your specific hydration needs. Tea, juices and liquid foods like soups, smoothies and yogurt can also count towards your fluid goal. The following options provide not only hydration, but also nutrients from food:

- Coconut water, cactus water, aloe vera water
- Electrolyte beverages
- Juices, milks, lemonade, iced tea and popsicles that are unsweetened or lightly sweetened
- Protein shakes, smoothies and bottled nutritional supplements
- Bone broth, soups, yogurts and frozen yogurts

MAINTAINING HYDRATION IS HARD. HERE ARE SOME TIPS:

- Drink fluids throughout the day with a goal of 4-6 ounces every hour.
- Fill a pitcher with your daily water needs and drink from it until it is empty.
- Keep a hydration journal or use a smart phone app to track your daily progress.
- If water tastes funny or bad to you, try adding lemon, cucumber or watermelon.

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RECIPES TO PROMOTE HYDRATION

VEGGIE SMOOTHIE

INGREDIENTS:

- avocado
- medium cucumber
- 1 stalk celery
- 1-2 handfuls of greens (spinach, swiss chard)

INSTRUCTIONS:

Add all ingredients to blender and blend until smooth. Add water to desired consistency.

GINGER-INFUSED CHICKEN NOODLE SOUP

INGREDIENTS:

- $4 4 \frac{1}{2}$ oz chicken breast (bone in or boneless)
- 3 quarts of chicken stock
- 1 large onion, diced
- 3 stalks celery, diced
- 3 medium carrots, sliced
- 1 tbsp ginger, minced
- 2 bay leaves
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1 cup spaghetti (broken into 1" pieces)
- 1 small tomato, diced
- Salt and pepper to taste

Serves 6

INSTRUCTIONS:

- In a medium stock pot, add chicken stock and chicken, and bring to a boil.
- 2 Boil for 5 minutes then skim the fat off the top.
- Turn to a simmer and add onions, celery, ginger, carrots, bay leaves and tomatoes and simmer for 30 minutes.
- 4 Remove chicken and let cool.
- S Chop chicken and place back into the broth. Add broken spaghetti and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.
